Brownsville is the community of my incursion it has a myriad of needs and issues Most of the people in this community are jobless and the pantry is a great resource for residences to source food. I have passed the pantry on numerous occasions and the lines are always long and

the numbers have increased since the pandemic. Health care is also important, the health center BMS is one of the organizations that caters to the health needs of the community. It was frequently overcrowded since it provides free COVID testing since the pandemic. Within every community there are people with special needs, the justice center provides support and protects the health, safety and pride of people with special needs and disabilities by advocating for their civil rights, preventing mistreatment, and investigating abuse or neglect. This community also have members that are drug addicts as I have observed while on my incursion. The Chemical Dependency Treatment Centers addresses the issue of drug abuse or addiction for people in the community. The Gregory Jackson Center was founded by and named after a community member who is now deceased. It for mentorship and is a space for residence and organizations within the community to work together to improve Brownsville. Day Care Centers are needed since parents or guardians must work and they provide service for adults, supervision and education for children. The public Schools are a great resource especially for parents who cannot afford private schools. The tuition is free, students receive free breakfast and lunch along with other extra curriculum activities such the afterschool program which is helpful for families who get off work late and cannot afford paying for a sitter. Family Services Network office provides a24hour services. I pass by this office on my way to work and I always see people going in and out or standing at the door especially since the pandemic. It offers care management, harm reduction program among other services. Engine 231 provides a great service to the community of Brownsville. There are always incidents with the wiring in apartments, circuit overload or the heat in the summer that causes fire. So, having the fire station there is an important and needed commodity. Many families that live in this community cannot afford to take their children to amusement parks so having a playground and a park is a needed resources for children and

family in the community to play, socialize and have fun. The churches also at times have a food and clothes pantry and they sometimes offer support and counselling for families and provide jobs.
