#### English System

- Constable-higher level official who responsible for keeping the peace among people in the mutual pledge
- <u>Shire-Reeve-</u>An official who was placed in charge of peace within a geographical area (what we now know as Sheriff)
- Even with these services, men in a given town were expected to serve night watch-known as "watch and ward" to protect against crime disturbances and fires.

#### Metropolitan Police of London

- Industrialization and urbanization created a need for urban police.
- In 1829, **Robert Peel**, helped lay the foundation for a modern, large-scale, uniformed paid police force.
- Introduce Robert Peel link
  - Officers were chosen among men based on their ability to reflect personal ideals.
  - Organized around the <u>Beat System.</u>

#### Policing in early America:

- In the North the system replicated the early English model.
- In the South, there were Slave Patrols
- Different regions different functions:
- On Frontier, there were Sheriff's, the Posse, Federal Marshals, the Military, and State Police.
- First U.S. Police Department Boston-1838, New York-1845
  - These were modeled after the London police and Robert Peel's nine principles.

#### Policing in early America: Founding - 1890

- Characterized by politics, corruption, and brutality.
- Political influence:
- Politicians determined who would be appointed, promoted, dismissed, etc.
- The police served as an enforcement arm of the political party, and control the rapidly increase number of immigrants.
- Generalist function:
- Officers performed duties such as: Street cleaning, inspecting boilers, caring for the homeless, operating ambulances.

- Policing in America: Reform Era, 1890 1920
  - Implementation the civil service system-attempts to root out political patronage and corruption.
- Policing in America: Professionalism Era, 1920 –
  1960s
  - Use of Technology –Radio, police vehicles, dispatch, etc.
  - Professionalism-standard procedures and training
  - Expansion of a Federal role after Prohibition (e.g. FBI and J. Edgar Hoover)

- Policing in America: Radical Change 1960s and 1970s
  - Rapid social change
  - Marches, demonstrations, protests, riots
  - Civil rights movement
  - Rapidly rising crime rates
  - Vietnam era
  - Police were often the target of criticism
  - Often caught in the middle
  - · Case law from Supreme Court-Miranda v. Arizona; Terry v. Ohio

- Policing in America 1980s & 1990s
  - Diversity in policing
  - Crack epidemic
  - High crime rates
  - Zero-tolerance, Broken windows
  - Use of technology-Compstat
