

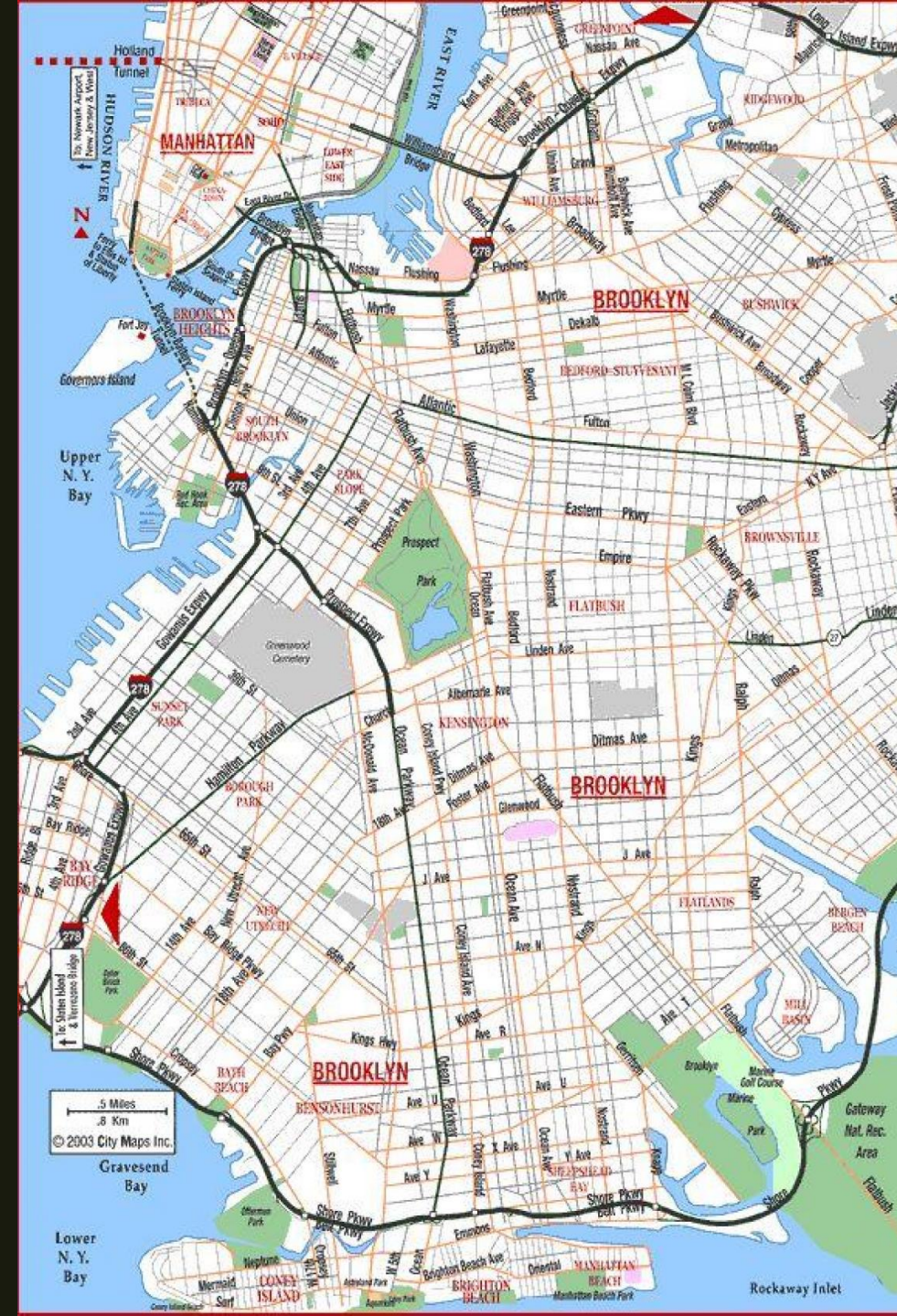


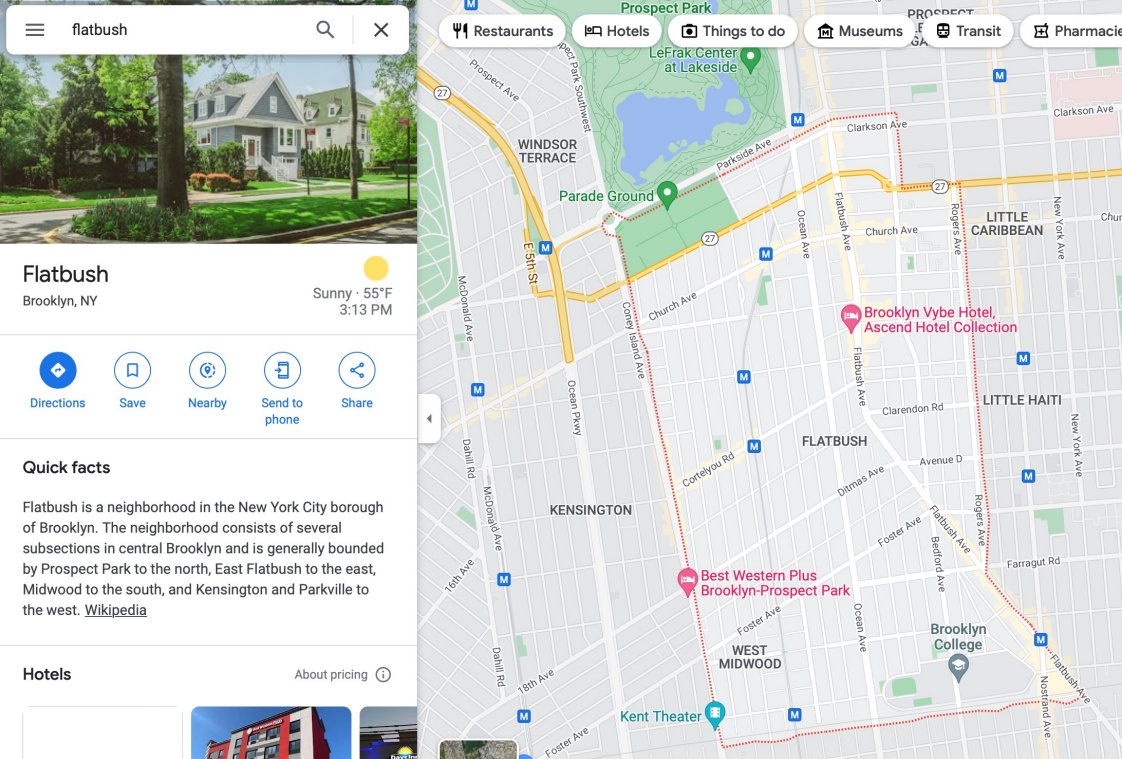
FLATBUSH, BROOKLYN

- It starts from the very beginning of Downtown Brooklyn to the very tip at Ave U, reaching the Belt Parkway.

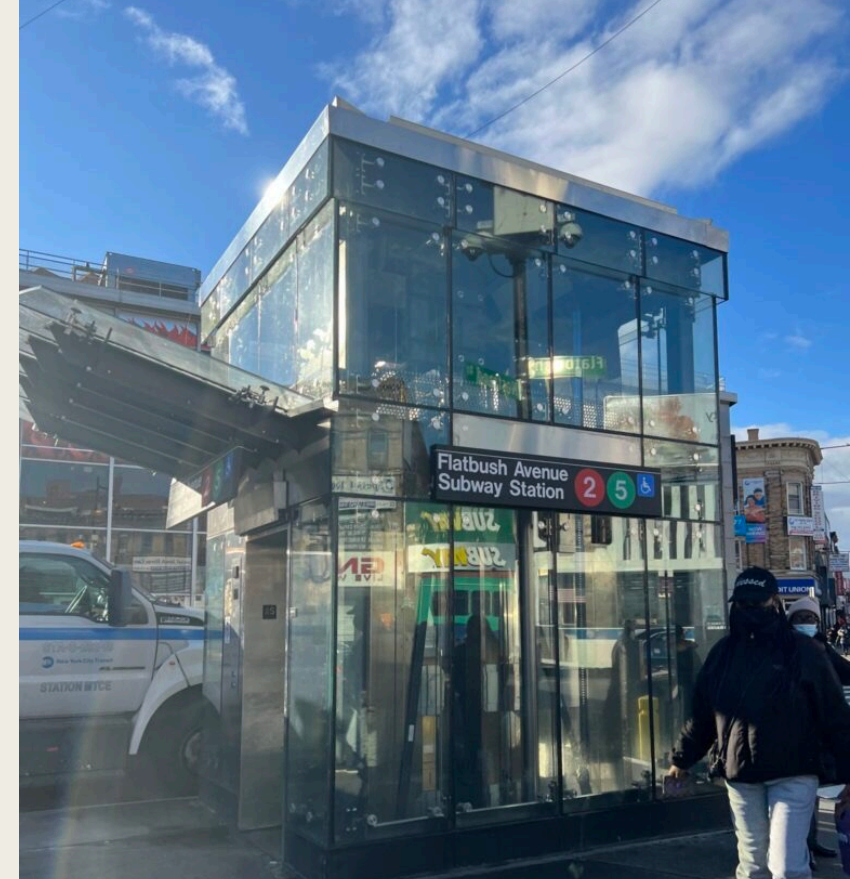




Flatbush Junction
