### FIELDWORK SEMINAR

Students complete the required 15 hours of fieldwork for ECE 110 by enrolling, attending and participating in this fieldwork seminar. **The fieldwork seminar will meet on-line for six sessions of the semester**. The ECE 110 fieldwork seminar is graded pass/fail based on participation in required class activities. NOTE: Any student who fails the fieldwork seminar AUTOMATICALLY fails the entire ECE 110 course, regardless of your earned grade in the lecture portion of ECE 110.

This course will help to develop your professional identity as an early childhood educator. An important component of your professionalism includes being engaged, both on the college campus and in the early childhood classroom.
