COURSE DESCRIPTION

This semester we will begin exploring the theories, methods, and materials of curriculum planning in early childhood education (PreK–Gr2), with an emphasis on providing developmentally and culturally appropriate learning environments and experiences that encourage creativity and critical thinking skills in young children.

Each week we will engage in great depth with readings and workshops that will enhance your understanding of how to design learning environments and curriculum. Our topics will include:

- The importance of nurturing creative thinking in young children
- The role of play in learning
- The design of creative, developmentally appropriate learning environments
- The role of visual arts, music, movement, theater and language arts/emergent literacy in developing children's cognitive, social-emotional, physical, language and self-help skills.

Course work includes workshops in planning and implementing creative arts experiences for young children.

PREREQUISITES: ENG or ESL 095; ACR 095 AND ECE 110 (C or better)

FIELDWORK SEMINAR

Students complete the required 30 hours of fieldwork for this course by participating in the fieldwork seminar. This seminar activities and projects will give you experience in creative, developmentally appropriate, and culturally responsive teaching practice. The fieldwork seminar accounts for 25% of your grade.

E-PORTFOLIO

This semester, you will continue working on your electronic portfolio (e-Portfolio), which is a required record of your preparation in early childhood education at BMCC. In this course, you will:
