
## **Essay 3 Directions**

This week you will complete the final draft of your essay project. You will expand on the corrected first draft by incorporating your approved *secondary source* information into the essay. This is the information discussed in the research summary.

- Do not simply paste your research summary into the final draft.
- Do not just tag the research summary onto the end of your essay.
- <u>Do</u> weave the secondary source information through the body of your essay.

Your final draft must be 3-4 pages (750 – 1000 words) in length with an additional Works Cited page. Please follow the steps below and make use of the outline below.



### Step 1:

For this final assignment you must return to the first draft that you have already written. Be sure to incorporate any comments/corrections I made to your draft before you proceed. Remember that your chosen work of literature is considered a *primary source*.

## Step 2:

Now you must incorporate information from at least one *secondary source* into the body of your essay. The secondary source should be the same one that you submitted in your Research Summary. *Be sure to include at least two quotes from your primary source and two quotes from your secondary source, using correct in-text citation.* Use author's last name, and page number, if there is one.

Please follow the outline below:

## **Original Title**

#### Introduction

• Identification of title of works of literature and author

- Very brief (1 or 2 sentences) overview of work under discussion
- Thesis Statement

## **Body**

- Topic sentences to introduce the main idea of *each* paragraph
- Development of *thesis* with reference to text of the literary work
- Support of *thesis* with at least two quotes from the *primary source*
- Support of *thesis* with at least two quotes from the <u>secondary source</u>. (Weave this information into the essay, rather than just tagging it on).

### Conclusion

- Restatement of *thesis* (not repetition)
- Encapsulation of main ideas
- Satisfying ending

### **Works Cited**

Include a Works Cited page with entries for <u>both primary and secondary sources</u>. Citations for the possible primary sources are included at the bottom of these directions. Citations for secondary sources are provided on the BMCC library databases with the articles.
