Final Draft Essay Directions

This week you will write a 3-4-page final draft of the essay you have been working on. Please follow the outline given below. <u>Use your corrected first draft as the basis for the essay. Do not write a whole new essay.</u>

OUTLINE

Original Title

(Try to make it interesting!)

Introduction

- Identify title and author of the story
- Give a brief (2-3-sentences) overview of the story
- Present a *thesis statement*.

Body

- **Topic sentences** to introduce the main idea of *each* paragraph.
- Development of *thesis* with reference to the text of the literary work
- Support of *thesis* with reference and at least two quotes from the story, using correct MLA citation: Author's last name and page number if there is a page number; e.g. (Joyce 5). Notice that there is no comma after the author's name).
- Support of **thesis** with reference and at least one quote from the secondary source you documented in your Research Summary.

Conclusion

- Restatement of *thesis* (not repetition)
- Encapsulation of main ideas
- Satisfying ending

- Citation for primary source
- Citation for secondary source (refer to your Research Summary)

Step 1:

For this final assignment you must return to the first draft that you have already written. Be sure to incorporate any comments/corrections I made to your draft before you proceed. Remember that your chosen work of literature is considered a *primary source*.

Step 2:

Now you must incorporate information from at least one *secondary source* into the body of your essay. The secondary source should be the same one that you submitted in your Research Summary. *Be sure to include at least two quotes from your primary source and two quotes from your secondary source, using correct in-text citation.* Use author's last name, and page number, if there is one.

Please follow the outline below:

Introduction

- Identification of title of works of literature and author
- Very brief (1 or 2 sentences) overview of work under discussion
- Thesis Statement

Body

- Topic sentences to introduce the main idea of *each* paragraph
- Development of *thesis* with reference to text of the literary work
- Support of *thesis* with at least two quotes from the *primary source*
- Support of *thesis* with at least two quotes from the <u>secondary source</u>. (Weave this information into the essay, rather than just tagging it on).

Conclusion

- Restatement of *thesis* (not repetition)
- Encapsulation of main ideas
- Satisfying ending

Works Cited

Include a Works Cited page with entries for *both primary and secondary sources*. Citations for the possible primary sources are included at the bottom of these directions. Citations for secondary sources are provided on the BMCC library databases with the articles.
