



UNIT 4: Where We Live





Activities

- Show And Tell




Activities:


Activities:

- Building our School
 Children would have the opportunity to make their school community with lego blocks

- Match The Image With The Word
 Children would have variety of

 be done as a class so that students

 Each student would get a sticker
 once they had their turn
- Favorite Place In Brooklyn The teacher would be setting tables into groups and ask the students what their favorite place in their neighborhood, they would then paint on white posters, and use materials such as glue, foam letters, pictures of "Brooklyn"
- Sounding Out The Letters
 Children would sound out each
 letter of the alphabet that the book
 "B is for Brooklyn" has provided. We
 would then clap along every letter
