Quiz Explanation

The document is set up with 6 rows and 6 columns. Most of the elements of my designs conform to sizes defined by the grid of the page. Text boxes and picture frames all fit into each other snuggly. The hierarchy leads the viewers eyes down to the large, bright St. Petersburg title, which is aligned to the bottom margin. This is written in Futura BdCn BT Bold. From there they go up to the sub head which is aligned to the main title. This is also written in Futura BdCn BT Bold. The background image takes up most of the page and acts as white space. I chose to contrast the blue background with orange for the title and white for the sub head. I chose white instead of black for the sub head to give it more weight than the black I would use for the body copy. I made use of kerning and tracking in the title and sub head to make sure they aligned to each other, the body copy box, and the margins. The body copy, along with the rest of the pictures, sits in a vertical white stripe. This element marks the whole height of the page through the margins but breaking for the title to maintain the hierarchy. From top to bottom the stripe holds an image, then the call out, another image, the main body copy, and the final image. The call out is in orange to contrast and draw the eye. This is written in SST Bold. I chose the same color as the title to contrast the white background. The body copy is written in SST Light.
