Course Description: What is the goal of FYE Seminar class?

When you registered for Immersion, you signed up to study Math or Writing. That is part of what you will study. You also signed up to study something else—how to become a successful college student. Immersion FYE Seminar will be an opportunity for you to do some self-exploration. You will research your major, tap into and discover your skill-sets, work on budgeting your time to meet the demands of college. We will explore the key departments and offices Borough of Manhattan Community College has to offer. In addition, you will be prepared to start your path to completing an Associate's Degree and beyond.

Self -Exploration Unit

What are the components of a person? What makes up a person? How does this influence what life decisions a person makes? Over the course of the semester we will explore:

- Your Identity: personality, values, experience/knowledge, interests, talents, skills
- Your Vision: what you want for yourself and your life
- Your Plan: the steps you'll take to get what you want
- **Experiment:** the way to test and evaluate if the vision and plan is working for you

Throughout this unit you will gather information about yourself that may be relevant to an intended major and career. These components will be the foundation for the research unit.

Research Unit

These assignments will help you gain awareness about the college process, life as a college student and prepare you for Borough of Manhattan Community College classes.
