("10 Common Parenting Mistakes That Demotivate Your Children") Dance and sport can improve kinesthetic intelligence, and games and discussions can boost intrapersonal intelligence. Next, is Micromanaging the children produces comparable results to micromanaging employees. It builds resentment, damages relationships, and robs children of valuable learning experiences. When children can plan their work and take responsibility for their actions, they become more mature and wiser. They also develop independence and organizational skills that will help them in school and beyond. Children who take responsibility for their actions come to understand that they have control over their life. They learn that they can create their success in school and beyond. Let the children know you are there for them if they need support. However, make it clear that they should not look to their parents for all the answers. If they need help, supply strategies they can use to find the answers themselves. Parents who think of themselves as facilitators rather than supervisors foster self-sufficiency in their children. These are just a few vital skills for children to learn and carry with them through life.

Secondly, how can Parents be supporting children with aspirations? Children may get discouraged from learning if they are forced to learn things they are not connected to or interested in. Children motivated to learn to attend School regularly do better academically and display pro-social classroom behavior, according to Waterford.org. Children with engaged parents are more likely to Earn higher grades or test scores, Graduate from high school, attend post-secondary education, develop self-confidence and motivation in the classroom, and have better social skills and classroom behavior. They are also less likely to Have low self-esteem,

need redirection at the school and develop behavioral issues. Unfortunately, up to 20 percent of students in any year are described as disconnected. Many do not catch up academically in later years.

Nonetheless, No one likes to feel powerless or as though they have little control over their lives. Think about how they would feel if they were told what to wear, how much TV they could watch, and when they could use their phone. It is reasonable to have rules at home, but I would recommend that the parents first discuss them with their children. Workplaces that introduce strict rules without consulting their staff often find that their team has started to rebel. The children can avoid a mutiny at home by bringing up the matter with children before laying down the law. Whenever possible, have a brainstorming session where the children could share their concerns. The children may even propose better guidelines than the parents could have thought of, so be sure to listen to their opinions. Taking this approach will mean less frustration for everyone involved. In addition, the children will be more likely to adhere to the rules overall too. Thirdly if this situation continues, it could affect many lives, such as children, families, and communities. Unmotivated children tend to opt out, do the bare minimum needed, and can be challenging to teach. They are unwilling to participate in class discussion, often look bored, tune out, distract others, give up easily on tasks, talk out turn, arrive late to class, disrupt the flow of styles, and have poor attendance. As they get older, they are more likely to skip classes, engage in challenging anti-social behaviors, and are more at risk of dropping out of School. Then Parents become frustrated with their children, and sometimes, instead of looking for a solution, it can lead to nagging that could cause them to run away from the problem. I am saying that it does

not mean that parent does not mean well with this situation but finding the right balance is essential. According to Science, children's brains are not fully developing till later in life, which means they need much guidance, and to make them walk in our adult shoes instead of guiding them can cause much trouble.
